Being involved in a neighbourhood plan would give us a greater say in planning applications in our area allowing us to play an active part in the future of where we live. It will allow us to influence the direction of travel on key decisions that affect us all (e.g. relief roads, provisions and services)



How to Remove a Tick


When removing a tick remember the following




Don't compress the tick.

Don't leave the tick mouth parts in the skin.


This is best achieved by using fine pointed tweezers (shown right) or a specialist tick removal tool such as a O'TOM@ hook (Tick Twister@) shown below. Specialist Tick removal tools are available from all good veterinary clinics and pet shops.



Choose the most suitable hook, according to the size of the tick.



Engage the hook by approaching the tick from the side (the body of a tick is flat) until it is held.



Lift the hook very lightly and TURN IT (screwing or unscrewing)







When a tick is fixed in the host, it injects saliva in the skin, which contains :

• Allergenic matters, which cause oedema (swelling) and erythema (redness) on the bite's point, and pruritus (itching).

Infectious agents which are transmitted from the tick to people or animals e.g. Lyme Disease.

When the tick is grabbed with tweezers or similar instruments, the tool exerts a pressure on the tick's body: this pressure promotes saliva back-flow in the host skin, and increases the risk of injection of allergenic matters and above all the risk of transmission of tick-borne microorganisms. When the tick is grasped with a specialist tool, there is no pressure on the tick's body, thus, reducing the risk of the injection of allergenic matters and the transmission of micro-organisms. **Do Nots**

or fillero-organisms.

Do Not use your fingers.

Do Not squeeze the tick.

Do Not use a burning match.

Do Not use a cigarette.

Do Not use petroleum jelly

Do Not use cleaning fluid.

Staverton footpath signs - what do they mean?

Signage about footpaths on the triangle of land south of Blackthorn Way have raised questions from residents as the legalistic wording of the notices is somewhat incomprehensible. Apart from the canal towpath there is one designated footpath crossing the land. The notice has been prompted by a submission by the landowner to prevent any further footpath designations. As has happened in Holt recently official paths can be created if the public have been walking on particular routes 'as of right' for twenty years. 'As of right' is a curious concept – it means the landowner neither gave specific permission nor barred access.

The notice means this right cannot now be invoked on the land, unless anyone decided they wanted to put the case that they'd been using a path across the land for twenty years before the date of the notice.

The existing footpath is not affected.
The area has previously been designated for housing development, though the difficulty of access is believed to be putting the house builders off.

Residents and councillors have criticised Wiltshire Council over its handling of the construction of a new roundabout for the Kingston Farm development at Holt Road in Bradford.

The original plan as explained by WC Highways didn't involve a full road closure despite that being the developers' preference. Then with no more than a week's notice of the event WC put up signs announcing a 20 week closure.

This is causing traffic congestion, with drivers looking for shortcuts rather than following the 'official' diversion routes.

The council's consultation on cuts to bus services has now closed. Over 11,000 questionnaires were returned, making it the second largest response to any Wiltshire Council consultation. A detailed analysis of the results is on the WC website. It seems the main priority was to preserve rural and strategic network services, so that people and communities do not become isolated. Evening and Sunday services were given a lower priority overall. Any cuts to specific services caused by withdrawal of subsidies would need a further consultation.

Following the demise of the Hopper bus I'm offering lifts to the RUH to any Staverton residents who previously used the service and are now having difficulty getting to appointments there. This would only be suitable for those who can travel in an ordinary car. If possible please give a couple of weeks notice, and send an email or call 01225 762032 to arrange.

Wiltshire Council has announced a further round of cuts to youth services. Two years ago budgets were slashed and youth workers sacked. Local communities and Area Boards were given the job of salvaging something useful from the wreckage, with one youth officer per community area surviving. Now the number of youth workers employed by county is to be reduced again from 18 to 7, so that in future one youth officer will cover more than one area. WC says the action is, "In line with the council's priority to enable communities to do more for themselves."

Reductions in budgets mean the amount available for the Area Board to fund highways improvements or community projects has declined, but there is still some money available - see the Wiltshire Council area board website for details. I'm looking at the possibility of getting the council to check levels of air pollution along the B3105. When the District Council measured this ten years or so ago the levels were found to be below the legal limits - whilst this may still be the case it would be useful to establish it one way or the other. Over 100 people took a trip on one of the day boats provided for the occasion.




Hire boats were set up for viewing and tea, coffee and biscuits were served on board one of these.



Again; not only has this term gone supersonic quick but the whole school year has just disappeared into a black hole.

This term we have been talking about space, the children's interest sparked by Tim Peake being in the media. While doing this we talked

about the similarities and differences between ourselves and others and understood that we are all

We made our own planets from junk, some had pink spots, others were square in shape and one even had twenty moons. After reading 'Aliens Love Underpants' we looked at different patterns and designed our own patterned underpants which we hung on the washing line.

We will be saying goodbye to some of our children in July and wish them well in their new adventure at 'Big School'.

We hope that by letting them explore the world around them at this age, we have inspired them. Inspired a future engineer, by taking apart an old computer keyboard and seeing what is inside. A future doctor, by exploring the toy doctors kit and turning the staff into Egyptian mummies as they bandage them. A future architect, by building that castle for Rapunzel out of bricks. A chef; by exploring the mud kitchen. An artist; by allowing them to wallow up to their armpits in paint. A scientist; by exploring what happens when you mix bicarbonate of soda with vinegar (try it yourself) or even the next Tim Peake.

All it now leaves me to say is that after fifteen great years of working at Nestlings I am leaving to take a long overdue gap year to travel and see the world. So thank you for reading my tales of pre-school, I hope you have enjoyed them.


