Marina Drive traffic survey

Following complaints from residents about speeding traffic in the 20mph zone on Marina Drive a 'metrocount' survey was carried out between January 24th and February 2nd. A total of 10,936 vehicles were checked. The average speed was 19.0mph and the 85th percentile was 23.0mph (the 85th percentile is the speed at or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling).

Wiltshire Council uses these criteria for 20mph roads based on the 85th percentile:

20 to 24mph = No Further Action

24.1 to 38.9 mph = Eligible for Community Speed Watch

Over 39mph = Subject to Police enforcement These results mean you won't be seeing the Community Speed Watch team on Marina Drive for now. However it will be operating as usual on the main B3105 through the village. More volunteers are required for this - please get in touch if you'd like to help.

Canal Road Recycling Centre



A queue for the HRC

Anyone driving from Staverton into Trowbridge at weekends will be aware of the congestion caused by traffic queueing to get into the Household Recycling Centre (HRC). We've been encouraging the council to review their decision to cut opening times and they've now done that. Trowbridge and two other HRCs will get an extra day over the summer. At February's budget-setting council meeting a proposal to increase the opening times at all the 07757 506470 county's HRCs so they could open an hour earlier in the mornings, when the queues tend to be biggest, was not approved.

Although not easily provable, the suspicion is that an increase in fly-tipping was linked to the previous cuts.

Your Council Tax

At that same council meeting the budget was set for next year. The Wiltshire Council part of the council tax is to be increased by 5%, which when you include the increases in the Police and Fire precepts means a rise for many households of £100 or so. Although the rise is understandable given the state of the council's finances, I voted against it as I don't think it's fair to keep increasing the Council Tax by such large amounts.

Keeping Staverton Tidy

Thanks to everyone who responded to the recent appeal for more litterpickers for the March 5th clean-up, and for helpers with the environmental project to tidy up the areas in the village. I've applied for a small grant from the Area Board, and if this is successful I'll be discussing the way forward with Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, so if you volunteered I'll be in touch at that stage. If you didn't reply previously and would like to go on the mailing list then please get in touch.

Cheap swimming for young people at Bradford pool

A desire for less expensive swimming was one of the things that came out of an Area Board youth event held in January. So if you're aged 13 to 18 you can get a swimming session for £1.50 on Fridays (3.30 to 5pm) and Saturdays (2.15 to 5pm). You need to be resident in the Bradford on Avon Community Area which includes Staverton.

This is in addition to the free swimming you can get during school holidays.

Tamsin Quin is a local up and coming singer/songwriter from Devizes. Tamsin tells us about her fist guitar and about the inspiration for her songs.

I got my first guitar at about eight years old. However, that was soon confiscated by my parents after I used it to bash my little brothers over the head during

sibling rivalries. It wasn't until quite a few years later that my interest sparked up again. My dad lived on a canal boat so my teenage years were full of late nights, singing around the campfire on the towpath. Surrounded by musicians, I longed to join in and asked my dad to teach me guitar. My dad, being a fairly seasoned musician, jumped at the chance and started with 12 bar Blues. Looking back I now realise that this was one of my dad's cunning plans so he could have a jamming buddy on hand anytime. I have fond memories of sore fingers from playing 12bar blues for literally hours, whilst my dad jammed out lead over the top. My 'practising' did pay off though and I was soon borrowing guitars around the campfire.

My dad's deal was, if I practiced consistently for six months, then he would buy me a second hand guitar of my own. One day he took me to a guitar shop to show me different types of guitars available. The idea was to find what sort I was after and then try to find a cheap secondhand one similar. I was trying to hide the fact I'd fallen head over heels with this beautiful electro-acoustic Crafter with pearl inlay, but my dad noticed and (spoiled daughter alert) had soon put a deposit down. My dad was by no means well-off, quite the opposite actually, and I admit I had a tinge of guilt about him paying so much for a guitar for me. The months that followed consisted of us travelling back and forth to the music shop to pay a bit more off and I'd have a little play then put her back on the reserved shelf. One day dad said 'we're taking the van today', and I knew it was time to pick her up. We never had expensive things when we were kids and that guitar was my pride and joy for years. I wrote my first song on her (Equal Hearts) when I was fourteen and after that I was completely hooked. Songwriting quickly became my therapist and my saviour through my tough teenage years. I dabbled in and out of electric and acoustic guitar... rock, metal, folk depending on my mood. I was lucky and grew up on an eclectic mix of my parents' music; from System

of a Down, Roy Harper, Aerosmith, Cat Stevens, Tom Petty, The Strawbs, even a bit of Bon Jovi for good measure, many of which I still listen to today.

Since my turbulent teenage years are well over, inspiration for my songs nowadays comes in many other, calmer ways. Believe it or not, it's quite hard to write happy songs, some of the best songs come from heartbreak and misery, but even if you're mostly happy in your life (like me) you can still draw from things around you to write about. Sometimes it may come from a conversation I've overheard (Seventeen), or from a friend going through a bad time (Upward For Me), or from hearing rumours that get around this little town (Swapping Stories), and of course I am guilty of writing the occasional mushy love song (Gypsy Blood). Sometimes I might be talking to someone or thinking about something and just really like a word or a sentence and I'll go home and write a song based on that. It still works as gentle therapy and escapism for me but is also an important creative outlet to stop my mind whirring with ideas all day. I hope to continue writing songs for the foreseeable future, and although I love performing too, my dream would be to write songs for a living as that's where my real joy comes from.

Life-saving defib in Staverton Sports Field British Heart Foundation and Staverton Sports Field to give cardiac arrest victims fighting chance of survival

The BHF charity is campaigning for defibrillators to be made more accessible and recognisable to the public and want all young people to be taught CPR and PAD awareness at school. Since launching the campaign in 2014, at least 350,000 people have joined the Nation of Lifesavers by learning life saving CPR. To date the BHF

Kevin Aylesbury from Staverton Rangers said: "We are delighted to have raised enough money to help fund this lifesaving package. Creative Writing from Class 3:
