Warning to pet owners.

A Staverton resident has informed me of the loss of her cat which, according to the vet, was poisoned by antifreeze. Ingesting the smallest amount can cause kidney failure and death, especially in cats. Keep pets safe.

Accidental poisonings from spills/leaks, as well as leaking water coolant from cars happen every year, leading to pet death. Regularly check your car to ensure it isn't leaking water coolant. Take care storing, using and disposing of antifreeze and water coolant. Most accidental deaths are avoidable.

- Always keep antifreeze in clearly labelled, robust, sealed containers, away from pets and their environment.

- Clean up spills immediately, no matter how small. Ensure pets cannot access the area until it's clean and safe.

Always dispose of antifreeze and water coolant safely and responsibly. Contact your local authority for advice; see www.direct.gov.uk and 'search for your local council in England' on the home page. If you suspect antifreeze poisoning

If you suspect your pet's come into contact with antifreeze, leaked water coolant or if showing any of these symptoms get them to a vet immediately:

- Vomiting
- Seeming depressed/sleepy
- Appearing drunk and uncoordinated
- Seizures (fits)
- Difficulty breathing

Signs of antifreeze poisoning can show 30 minutes after ingestion. It can be two/three days before signs of kidney failure are seen.

The sooner your pet receives veterinary treatment, the better their chances of survival.

If left untreated, antifreeze poisoning can cause pain, suffering and distress and ultimately death.

Parish

With all the arguments around Brexit, it was refreshing to hear of the engagement of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle. Our congratulations to them both for a long and happy marriage.

It is also a time when I like to reflect on events over the past year and thank those people who have given selflessly of their time for the benefit of our lovely community.

We sadly saw the departure of Russell Clark from the Parish Council for the best reasons as a new baby joined his family and soon after we welcomed Jeff Gibson as our latest Parish Councillor. Already Jeff has made great contributions to our Council. A big thank you to all our Councillors who have worked hard this year and given up their valuable time to improve our community. Several of our councillors are raising young families and your concerns are their concerns. We still have one vacancy left and we would like to hear from you. We meet 6 times a year for a couple of hours.

PLAY AREA, SCHOOL LANE: This play area is the only one in Staverton owned and maintained by the Parish Council. As you may remember, earlier in the year, the Parish Council was awarded a grant from the Big Lottery of £10,000 for new play equipment adding to £26,000 already spent in grants from the Parish Council, the Wiltshire Council and the Superior Community Fund in recent years. We used this to build a small bridge, wooden walkways and a new springer frog. The Parish Council spent an additional £1,000 this year on existing equipment and two of our Councillors have also been carrying out minor repairs. We hope the children are enjoying the newest installations.

STAVERTON VILLAGE HALL: The village hall was originally built as a pavilion for adult football but turned out to be financially unviable due to high overhead costs. Following a meeting of the community it was agreed that Staverton needed a village hall and with the magnificent help of many local volunteers in staggered working parties, walls were knocked down and the changing rooms were turned into one large main hall to be hired out to local groups and for children's parties. It has been such a success that requests were received at the end of last year to extend the very basic kitchen (without cooking

facilities) into a room, double the size, with more cupboard space including a cooker and a separate grill facility. A hatch window has now been installed in the kitchen to supply field users with "bacon butties" and outside catering. A large patio area has also been installed by the window to provide outside seating for future catering of field events and fetes. The Parish Council unanimously agreed to invest £7,460 on the new kitchen scheme and work should be completed by Christmas 2017. The improved facilities have been welcomed by all hirers. Fees for the regular hire by local groups are £7 per hour plus 20% VAT. Fees for the one off hire for parties etc. are £11 per hour plus 20% VAT. These fees will start as from 1st January 2018. All bookings for the village hall should be directed to Mrs Jo Middleton, Landlady of The Old Bear Pub at: stavertonvillagehall@gmail.com. Jo has been doing a great job co-ordinating bookings for the village hall. She is also a much loved and very busy Landlady. Thanks, Jo!

STAVERTON PLAYING FIELD: Our Councillors have shown great foresight in upgrading the fencing and gates achieving one of the best playing fields for miles around. It sits in the centre of the village off Cygnet Way and is a jewel in our crown. Over £12,000 has been spent on the fencing and gates from the Maintenance Fund (not the Precept), over the last 3 years, which have been either replaced, repaired or upgraded and our field maintenance contractor has done an outstanding job of maintaining the grass. We have a hugely successful group of teams called Staverton Rangers, renamed from Trowbridge to Staverton to reflect the close link with Staverton and increasing influx of local players. The team was close to being disbanded when the original team manager Wendy Grant retired. However with sheer hard work, Team Managers, Kevin Aylesbury and Nicola Heal with the support of others, have seen the teams go from strength to strength. The new kitchen facilities will also benefit our young footballers and their supporters. Well done everyone!

We mustn't forget that we share the field with Staverton C of E Primary School and they have use of the field during school hours. The Parish Council is working with the School to update the Management Agreement which expires in December 2017.

DOGS ILLEGALLY FOULING THE PLAYING FIELD: It regularly comes to our attention that irresponsible dog owners are using the field to exercise their dogs and not picking up their dog's faeces. Dogs are prohibited on the field and it is **illegal** to leave dogs' faeces. Offending owners will be prosecuted and fined. Children play on this field and can pick up diseases from dog faeces, please can you report anyone to the police if you see them abusing this law. It has also been noted recently that tents have been erected on the field. It is prohibited to vandalise the turf in this way and obstruct the maintenance team from cutting the grass. Abandoned tents will be considered as fly tipping and removed and disposed of. Our grateful thanks to concerned residents contacting us about these issues.

Matters

As the Primary School does not have its own exclusive field, it is important that we remember that children use the field for sporting and after school activities.

POLICE MATTERS: I expect many of you have noticed that there has been a reduced police presence in Staverton over the last year or so since Wiltshire Constabulary has changed its working practices. Unfortunately small parishes like Staverton have had a dramatically reduced service from the police and officers can no longer find the time to attend Parish Council meetings, report on local crime and generally update the Parish Council on crime statistics. This is very regrettable as the Police website (the only way to access these figures) is often several months' out of date with its statistics. The Parish Council has agreed to petition the Wiltshire Commissioner and Area Commander to provide an explanation of the new policing methods and make known the Parish Council's disapproval at this reduced service.

PARISH STEWARD SCHEME: Our contact for this scheme is resident John Corfield. John works tirelessly with Wiltshire Council and the Parish Steward to identify and target areas of neglect in Staverton. He has "nagged" Wiltshire Council relentlessly to get these areas maintained and praises the efforts of our Parish Steward for removing years of neglected vegetation. However John needs input from residents. If you know of any particular area needing attention please contact the parish clerk on parishclerk@stavertonparishcouncil.org.uk. The Parish Council offers its thanks to John for keeping our community tidy.

PRECEPT 2018/19

At the Parish Council meeting held on 20th November council budgets and the Precept for 2018/19 were discussed. Bank account reserves were considered adequate at £16,396 estimated for Year End March 2017/18. This includes outstanding expenditure on the village hall and other costs to year end. In view of this it

was decided for the third year running not to increase the parish levy. The Precept to be requested from Wiltshire Council is a parish levy of £32.94 per household pa multiplied by a figure of 689.04 Band D Properties paying council tax in Staverton, provided by Wiltshire Council. The calculation raises the sum of £22,696.97 for 2018/19. As at November 2017 the reserves held to maintain the playing field were £65,000 invested with Julian Hodge Bank and £13,874.70 held in Nat West Bank to pay for grass cutting and other costs. These funds are ring fenced and cannot be used for anything other than the maintenance and future capital investment in the playing field. During 2017/18 the Primary School paid in £1,193 and the Parish Council £2,383 as top up contributions relating to the the amount of land owned by each authority i.e. 1/3rd the School and 2/3rds the Parish Council.

The Parish Council would like to thank Mr Richard Blueitt of Superior who prints our excellent Newsletter and has donated funds of over £8,000 to Staverton. These funds have been invested in a variety of projects over the last few years. He is also a very active "litter picker" who is keen to see our community neat and tidy.

Our thanks also go to Wiltshire Councillor Trevor Carbin who attends every council meeting giving his support and organising Litter Picks twice yearly. Councillors and residents alike turn up in all weathers and do a fantastic job of clearing our streets of litter. I understand that the quantities of rubbish are starting to reduce so we are doing something right! ***The next litter pick is on Sunday 13th March 2018.***

I cannot finish without thanking our Staverton Newsletter Editor, Caroline Smith. Caroline has been producing an excellent read for us all over several years, providing a necessary link between the Parish Council and all our resident readers. I am told that it makes newcomers feel very welcome and part of their new community.

Thestfield Drive reed beds

The work to tidy up the reed bed area went ahead on October 31st. Wiltshire Wildlife Trust managed to clear and open most of one side and cut back all around the site. They also came across one of the inlet pipes and took out a willow blocking the pipe, plus a mat of about 20 feet of root and soil that had obviously blocked the pipe. Before they did this nothing was flowing but afterwards the pipe flowed freely with a strong current.



This I found rather worrying, because the reed beds are meant to take excess water in times of heavy rain. If the culverts are blocked then we could get flooding elsewhere. I've had meeting on site with Wiltshire Council's drainage engineer and am awaiting his recommendations.

Clearly the work of maintaining the area, and also doing something about the other reed bed off Marina Drive, needs to continue, so I'm asking the Area Board to consider more funding.

I hope Wiltshire Wildlife Trust will be able to keep helping as I think they did an excellent job in Staverton, to go with the good work they do across the county.

The autumn spring-clean was on Sunday October 15th. Thanks to those who turned out. The good news was that the amount of rubbish in the public areas was less than on previous occasions, though we still took a car-load of litter to the tip.

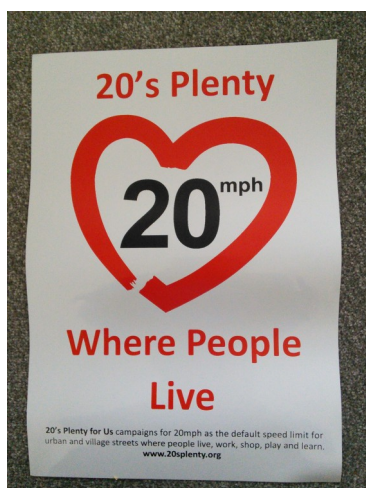
Area Board

The next meeting, at 7pm on January 24th, will be held at South Wraxall village hall. It will focus on the rural areas, with agenda items including traffic in and around the villages, broadband speeds, and flooding. That will include a discussion with Wiltshire Fire and Rescue service on possible flood gates on the B3106 Holt Lane and B3105 Causeway to stop drivers entering flood water when the Avon rises.

Since December 2004 some 29 people, including children, have been rescued by the Fire Brigade and 30 vehicles have been recovered from the waters.

Thought from the Rectory

I wonder whether you have been on an eventful journey; a journey that has stuck in your mind much later? One of my memories is of towing our caravan home from a family holiday in Ireland. As we were making good time I persuaded my family it would be good to explore a well-known town on the way to the port. Unfortunately I took a wrong turn in some road works – and ended up with the unwelcome choice of towing into a multi-story car park or across the top of a pedestrian shopping precinct. I chose the latter – and I wasn't allowed to stop anywhere else before we reached the port!

That journey, although tense, had its funny side. However, I'm aware that many people make journeys beyond my comprehension for truly difficult reasons. Out of a pre-war population in Syria of 22 million over 11 million people have fled their homes, nearly half of whom have fled to other countries, including Britain, often leaving everything they own behind.

The story of Jesus' birth is full of accounts of difficult journeys. Joseph and pregnant Mary had to go from Nazareth to Bethlehem prior to Jesus' birth in the manger. The wise men travelled hundreds of miles from

the East to see God's promised saviour. Worst of all, following Jesus' birth, Mary and Joseph had to escape to Egypt in order to avoid baby Jesus being murdered by King Herod. Jesus began life as a refugee. Yet all involved in these journeys were aware of God's presence with them in their troubles.

Through Jesus' birth in the stable all those years ago God has revealed his love for us in a new way. We are, loved and forgiven by God and accepted with all our faults and failings. He is alongside us in all situations – including times of difficulty, as he was with those long-ago travellers. Jesus calls us all to turn to him for guidance and support as we journey through life. He also calls us to care for those around us; whether near or far.

As ever, it's been a busy start to the school year with various celebrations and events taking place as well as some academic study! We welcomed six

Reception pupils, with a further child joining us in January, and three other new entrants higher up the school. All have settled in well, but our increase in roll has meant that now more than ever we need our building extension. So, amongst the day-to-day routine, staff, parents and supporters have been busy fundraising. Our recent Christmas Market raised over £800 so a huge thank you to all who supported us. Watch out for further events throughout the year!

This term the children have spent time during history considering the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther. The German monk 'kick started' the Reformation when he posted his 95 theses on the door of the castle chapel in the German town of Wittenberg. He proclaimed that salvation was solely a gift of God through Christ to those who would accept the faith, and not through good works or gifts to the church. The pupils have explored the effects of his work and ministry on the church and society in Britain.

Meanwhile in art, pupils have been studying natural form through the works of Andy Goldworthy, a British sculptor and photographer. service, being held at Zion Baptist Chapel in Trowbridge, is one of the highlights of the year and doubles up as our GCSE presentation evening. Our leavers have gone on to further study at various colleges and sixth form schools in the area. We wish them all the very best further to their GCSE success which once again puts Emmaus School as one of the most successful academically in the area. Happy Christmas.

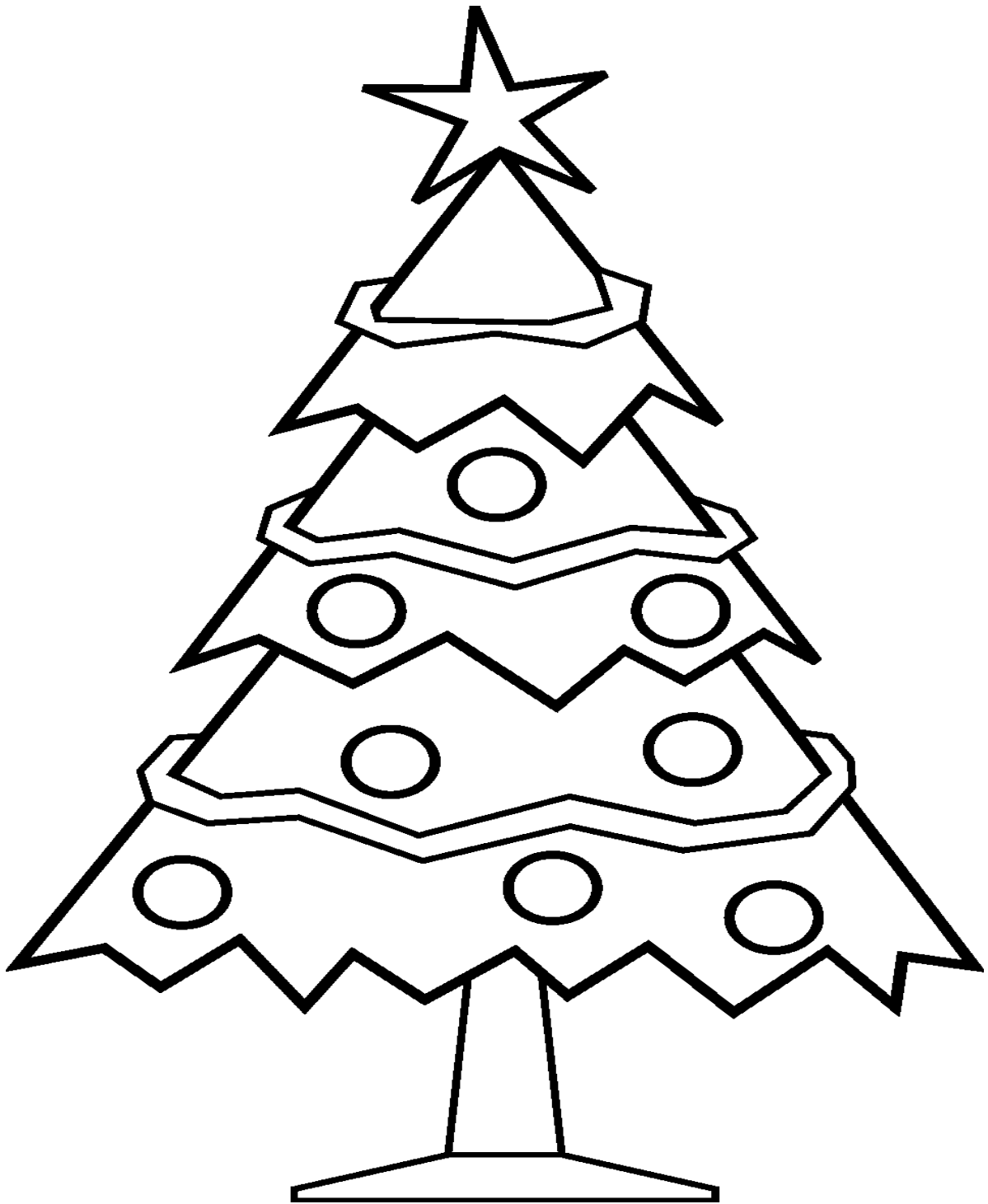
